#### What is Kwanzaa?

Kwanzaa is an African American holiday based on an African harvest celebration. Dr. Maulana Karenga created it in 1966 to help African Americans learn more about their roots. Many of the words used at Kwanzaa time come from Swahili – an African language. The word "Kwanzaa" comes from the Swahili word meaning first and stands for the first fruits of the harvest.

There are seven symbols that stands for something. The first symbol is the mkeka, or placemat. Its stands for history. The kinara, or candle holder, is the heat of the Kwanzaa setting. The kinara stands for people who lived many years ago in Africa,

There are seven principles of Kwanzaa. Principles are reasons for being which are not just for African Americans but may be important to all people.
